The local fair is entitled to send only the Grand Champion Quilts to the District Competition in October 2024. In the event that a Grand Champion Quilt was entered in multiple fairs and won there as well, then the quilt can only be presented to the District Competition by the fair that is considered the exhibitor's Home Fair. If the Grand Champion Quilt will be presented by another fair then the Reserve Champion will be presented by our fair.

An Exhibitor who wins a Grand Champion title with a different quilt at another fair shall be entitled to enter each winning quilt to compete at the District Competition.

The winners of the District competition in October 2024 will be entered in the competition at the O.A.A.S. Convention in February 2025. The winners at the Convention will receive $\$ 500.00$ and retain ownership of the quilt.
Please state "NO" on your entry tag if you do not wish your quilt to be considered for the District or O.A.A.S. Competitions.
***Note: Quilts smaller than the size stated will not be eligible for Grand Champion or Reserve Champion consideration.
***Note:Samples must be attached or the entry will not be eligible for Grand Champion or Reserve Champion consideration.

Bake at 350 F for 50 minutes or until toothpick inserted into center comes out clean.
