

- All exhibits must be on arena floor by 12:00 noon on Friday, and may not be removed before 4:00 pm on Saturday
- Exhibitors are to attach entry tag to their own entries
- Plants must be well established in pots, those live from the garden and potted will be disqualified
- Artificial flowers may only be used where specified
- A bud showing colour is considered a bloom, can be removed by cutting

- Entries may be brought to arena floor on Thursday evening 7:00 9:30 pm or Friday morning before noon.
- Exhibits may not be removed before 4:00 pm on Saturday. All prize money will be forfeited if exhibits are removed before 4:00, without permission from the Director in charge. Directors are not responsible for items not picked up by 4:30 pm.
- Parents are urged to allow children to do the work and the preparation of the exhibit by themselves. Give lots of encouragement.
- **PRIZES:** Gifts will be awarded for most points in the 3-4 years, 5-6 years, 7-9 years, 10-12 years, 13-16 years categories. A prize will be awarded to the youngest boy and girl. Child must be 3 years old at fair date.

VEGETABLES AND FRUIT:

3-4 Years Old:

- Decorate a Pumpkin as your favourite animal Accessories to be used- do NOT carve
- 2. Colour a SUN on a paper plate with a happy face

5 - 6 Years Old:

- 3. Make a train from garden veggies min. 3 different types & name your train!
- 4. Make a basket of 6 different fruits with coloured paper. 8x10 in size. Cut&Paste

7 - 9 Years Old:

- 5. 3, 3D veggies with coloured paper. Display on coloured paper plate. Can use crayons, pencil crayons, coloured paper.
- 6. Hedgehog made from fruits: small pumpkin or gourd as base can use toothpicks to attach the fruit. Can also use dried fruits / berries

10 - 12 Years Old:

- 7. Grandma and Grandpa wrinkle apple heads both wearing glasses that you have made
- 8. Carved medium size pumpkin (can be purchased pumpkin)

13 - 16 Years Old:

- 9. Necklace and matching bracelet made from dried fruit, berries, + cereal
- 10. Carve a pumpkin into a lantern (night skies theme) eg. stars,moon,planets etc

Open Class 3 - 16 Years Old:

- 11. Make a fruit or vegetable basket from branches, grapevine or woods. Must have handle, your own design
- 12. Smallest & Biggest Pumpkin
- 13. Tallest Corn Stalk

FLOWERS & FOLIAGE:

(See directions for showing flowers at beginning of adult flower category)

- 14. Leaf Collage
 Use a half sheet of Bristol Board, using a variety of real leaves
- 15. 3 flowers with their leafage in a mason jar for display

5 - 6 Years Old:

- 16. Colour 5 different flower heads on white paper 8x10 in size. Pencil crayons or paint
- 17. My favourite flower 3 stems in any container

7 - 9 Years Old:

- 18. Pick your own edible flowers dry & display in a mason jar Label with an adults help
- 19. Dried wild flower arrangement tied with a bow

10 - 12 Years Old:

- 20. Make a picture frame of garden flowers + foliage, dried + pressed. 5x7 picture frame, can be purchased
- 21. Plant a garden in a rubber boat. Must have min. 3 different type flowers. 1 Trailing foliage

13 - 16 Years Old:

- 22. Make a Tiara from flower you picked and dried. Grape vine + wildflowers, stem or branches.
- 23. Use any glass jar , create a terrarium. Succulants, mosses, soils, sands, earth, chicks + hens, etc

BAKING; 3-4 Years Old:

All baking is to be displayed on a suitable base and put in a clear plastic bag

- 24. Decorate a cookie as a pumpkin
- 25. Decorate 2 gingerbread cookies into a dog & cat

5 - 6 Years Old:

26. Decorate 3 cookies: 1 star, 1 moon, 1 sun Displayed on paper plate coloured as a pumpkin

27. Mud Pie cookies

2 cups sugar 6 Tbsp cocoa
1/2 cup butter 1 cup coconut
1/2 cup milk Pinch of salt
3 cups oatmeal 1 tsp vanilla

Bring first 3 ingredients to a boil and add vanilla. Mix dry ingredients. Add boiling syrup to dry ingredients and drop from teaspoon onto waxed paper to set.

7 - 9 Years Old:

28. Spider Cookies, use the following recipe Exhibit 3 on a plate in a plastic bag

1 cup of semi-sweet chocolate chipits

1 cup butterscotch chipits

2 1/2 cups Chinese noodles (not crushed)

Put both types of chipits in large bowl. Microwave on high 2 minutes or until mixture is smooth when stirred.

Add Chinese noodles and stir to coat well.

Drop by spoonful on waxed paper.

Press 1 miniature marshmallow on cookie to represent the head. Chill.

29. Bake a cake and decorate flower themed with 3 different colours

10 - 12 Years Old:

30. Banana Chocolate Chip Muffins, use the following recipe No Muffin Liners, Exhibit 3 on a plate in a plastic bag

2 eggs
2/3 cups melted butter
3 large white bananas
4 tsp baking powder

1 tsp baking soda 1 cup milk

1 cup chocolate chips

Mix together dry ingredients. Stir slightly beaten egg, milk, butter and bananas into

flour mixture. Do not beat. Place by spoonful into greased muffin tin. Fill muffin cups 2/3 full. Bake at 375 F for 15-20 minutes.

31. Your favourite fudge - 6 pieces diplayed on paper plate.

Colour the plate as a pumpkin. Label attached with ingredients listed

13 - 16 Years Old:

32. Apple Cinnamon Bread, Use the following recipe Placed in a plastic bag.

1/2 cup packed light brown sugar 2 tsp vanilla

1 1/2 tsp ground cinnamon 1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour 2/3 cup white sugar 1 1/2 tsp baking powder

1/2 cup butter, softened 1/2 cup milk

2 eggs 1 large apple, peeled and finely chopped

Grease & flour a 9x5 inch loaf pan. Mix brown sugar & cinnamon together in a bowl & set aside. Mix together white sugar & butter until smooth. Add eggs & vanilla, continue to beat on medium speed until combined. Add flour, baking powder & milk. Pour half the batter into the prepared pan then cover with half of the apples. Pat apples into batter with the back of spoon. Sprinkle with half of the sugar & cinnamon mixture. Pour remaining batter over apple layer, top with remaining apples & add more brown sugar/cinnamon mixture. Pat topping into the batter with the back of a large spoon. Bake at 350 F for 50 minutes or until toothpick inserted into center comes out clean.

1 1/2 cups raisins 1/2 cup honey

3/4 cup boiling water 13/4 cups of all purpose flour

1/4 cup butter 1/2 tsp salt

1/3 cup of brown sugar 1 tsp baking soda

1 egg 1/3 cup milk

Add boiling water to the raisins, let stand until cool. Cream the butter, sugar, egg & honey until light and fluffy. Sift the flour, salt & soda into the creamed mixture alternately with the cooled, drained raisins & milk, stirring only until smooth. Pour into a buttered loaf pan & bake at 350 F for 50-60 minutes.

3-6 Years Old:

 Use an egg carton and a variety of materials to make a bug
